USS RANKIN (AKA/LKA-103) 2004 REUNION REVIEW

Crewmembers of the great ship, USS RANKIN (AKA/LKA-103) held their annual reunion at the Norfolk Airport Hilton Hotel on October 28-31, 2004. One hundred sixty-seven (167) former shipmates and 122 spouses or guests pre-registered for this much anticipated event. An additional eight persons arrived unexpectedly for the banquet, but were accommodated, making a total of 297 persons attending the banquet on Saturday night.

The reunion officially "kicked off" at 12:00 noon on Thursday, October 28th when the registration desk and hospitality room opened. The hospitality room, the focal point of the reunion, was filled with ship memorabilia, coffee, cold drinks and snacks, and of course, sea stories. It was said that some of the stories were true, or at least based on something someone once said was true. As the afternoon wore on, the excitement increased with questions like, "Who is coming next?", "Who arrived while I checked into my room?", "When is so and so arriving?" It was a wonderful experience to see so many old friends getting reacquainted or meeting shipmates they did not know, or who served at a different time.

The first "planned" event was the welcome reception at 5:00 PM. Reunion Chairman Skip Sander welcomed everyone, and after some introductions, he previewed the activities for the coming days. Following his remarks, the bar opened and hors d'oeuvres were served. The remainder of the evening was spent socializing over cocktails, in the hospitality room or at dinner.

Friday morning began with a private breakfast buffet. Following breakfast, 76 members of the group boarded two motor coaches for a

trip to Williamsburg. This former co-Ionial capital helped shape American history and is a true landmark. After lunch the group re-boarded the bus for a leisurely ride along the Colonial Parkway to the quaint little village of Yorktown. The siege of Yorktown marked the end of the American Colony and the beginning of a new nation. The United States of America. The struggle and adventures of those early years of our freedom are depicted with engaging exhibits. The group actually walked on the battle grounds where history was made, where our freedom was bought and paid for in the blood of our ancestors.

Meanwhile, back at the Hilton, more shipmates were arriving. They had the same questions as those who arrived yesterday, and to their credit, patiently waited for the tour to return. For the first few minutes after the buses came back, it was a mad house, new arrivals trying to see who got off the bus, and vice versa. Then it settled down to a dull roar in the hospital room.

At 6:00 PM the cocktail hour began and long lines formed at the bar where adult beverages were being dispensed. Almost too quickly an hour passed and it was time for dinner—a traditional Virginia ham dinner (what else would you expect in Virginia?). Following dinner, "Shag4U", a local DJ, provided Shag lessons (for the few who participated) and played a variety of dance music for the dancers in the crowd. All in all it was a fun evening.

Saturday began with a private breakfast buffet and shortly after the meal, 180 souls boarded *four* motor coaches for a visit to Nauticus, the National Maritime Center where they saw a series of ingenious interactive exhibits, plus the IMAX Theater presentation, "The Living Seas," which

celebrates the beauty, power and significance of the oceans. Next door to Nauticus is the famous Battleship USS WISCONSIN, which had action in World War II, Korea, and most recently in the Persian Gulf War. The Wisconsin is now a museum ship and the main deck and sections of the two upper decks were open to visitors. Following the trip to Naucitus, a short walk brought the group to the Spirit of Norfolk for a luncheon cruise of Norfolk Harbor. The food was good, the entertainment was good and the cruise was good! The highlight of the day came next, a visit to Norfolk Naval Base. Although we were not able to go on board a ship, a riding tour with views of the many ships was very special.

Upon the return of the touring group, the business meeting was held. San Diego was selected as the reunion city for 2005.

Saturday evening was the highlight of the reunion. The evening began with a photo session trying to capture the images of each couple and single attendee. Simultaneously, the cash bar opened and some members availed themselves to a variety of adult beverages. At 2000 hours (8:00 PM) sharp, the banquet ceremonies began with the playing of "Anchors Aweigh." Immediately following "Anchors Aweigh," the Top Hatters Squadron and Honor Guard of Naval Sea Cadets from Norfolk presented the National Colors while "The National Anthem" was played. Following the anthem, the Pledge of Allegiance was recited and the Invocation was delivered. Chairman Skip Sander opened the banquet program with some welcome remarks for jobs well done. Then dinner was served. Following dinner, numerous items were raffled

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off, the proceeds going into the Association treasury.

During and after dinner, the "Just Friends Trio" entertained the group with a bevy of popular songs and closing the evening with a medley of patriotic songs.

Suddenly it was Sunday morning and almost time to go. The farewell breakfast was somewhat more somber than the previous breakfasts, each person realizing the time to go was nearly at hand. The majority of those at breakfast remained for the memorial service which paid tribute to deceased shipmates. Over 200 deceased shipmates' names were read and honored.

When it was over, no one wanted to be the first to leave, but ever-so-slowly a few began inching

toward the door. Then, as if by magic, the handshakes and hugs began, and more than a few tears were seen. It had been a wonderful experience, some calling it "the best three days of my life." In a few minutes all that remained in the room was the echoes of, "See you in San Diego."
